IDAHOANS CITED FOR WAR VALOR

Congressional Medals Given Thomas C. Neibaur and Chester H. West

Thomas C. Neibaur of Sugar City, Idaho, and Chester H. West of Idaho Falls, were Idaho's two winners of congressional medals of honor, according to the official list published in 1919. This is the highest award for valor in the world, the conditions of its award being even more difficult than those of the Victorian cross.

Neibaur, a member of Company M, 167th infantry, Rainbow division, won his medal in the Argonne near Landres St. George, October 16, 1918. That afternoon, while the fighting was especially bitter, he was sent out on patrol with his automatic rifle squad. As he gained the ridge he set up his rifle, and was at once wounded in both legs. Though he was cut off and surrounded, and the remainder of his detachment killed or wounded,

by his own efforts and by fire from the skirmish line of his company a hundred yards in the rear the attack was halted.

Takes 11 Prisoners

Four of the enemy, however, attacked Private Neibaur at close range. These he killed. He then moved alone amidst the enemy lying on the ground in front of him, under fire from his own lines, and captured 11 prisoners at the point of his pistol, and although painfully wounded he brought them back to his own lines.

West was first sergeant of Co. D, 363d infantry. He won his award in the Bois de Cheppy, in the Argonne sector, September 26, 1918. While making his way through the fog with an automatic rifle section, Sgt. West found his advance halted by direct and unusual machine gun fire. Without aid he at once dashed through the mist and fire, and attacking the nest, killed two of the gunners, one of whom was an officer. This enabled his company to advance farther without loss of a man.

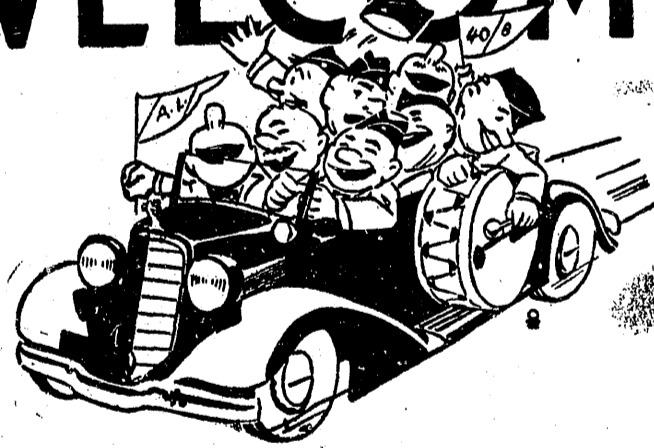
