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MURDERED AT MACE, IDAHO

TIMEKEEPER EUGENE KLEIN.
C. E. Sheriff, Who Did the Deed, is Caught and is in Jail at Wallace. Claimed Money That Was Not Due Him—Used a Rifle on His Victim—Was Closely Paroled.

Wallace, Idaho, Nov. 12.—A terrible murder occurred Monday morning at Mace, Idaho, a few miles from here. Eugene Klein, formerly a well known resident of Spokane, but recently the timekeeper for the Standard mine, under the employ of Finch & Campbell, was shot by a miser who did not get all the pay he thought was coming to him. The murder occurred about 9 o'clock Monday morning in the office of the Standard company at Mace. There was no witness of the shooting, as the only man who was about had been ordered out of the room by the murderer.

C. E. Sheriff, the man who did the deed, has been caught and is now in jail here. Saturday was pay day at the mine. Sheriff is supposed to have received his pay that he thought was due him. It is not known that there was any serious difficulty over this during the time that the men were being paid off. It is said that the man from the head office at Gem to hold out certain items from the man's pay.

Monday morning Sheriff came to the office of the Standard mine with a rifle. Only Mr. Klein and a man by the name of Lippert were in the office. Sheriff ordered Lippert to leave the room, which he did. An instant after leaving the building he heard the rifle shot. Sheriff then came out of the office, and passing Lippert, told him to keep his mouth shut and would do the same to him. He then made his escape.

When Mr. Klein was found he was unconscious, with a bullet in the lower part of the chest. He was taken to the hospital, but died a short time after.

Lippert immediately gave the alarm, and within a half hour there were 20 deputies from Gem out scouring the country for the murderer. The employes turned out and hunted the man, assisting the deputies in their search. The blacksmith from the mine, the miners and men of all cases and trades went in search of the fugitive. Warning was also telephoned to Gem, and in a short time the man was captured near that place. He still carried the fatal rifle, but made no resistance to arrest. He was taken to Wallace, where he is now in jail. He has made no statement as to the crime and it is said none will be allowed.

Mr. Klein leaves a wife and three children to mourn him—Vaughn, Chase A. and Mabel.

Berlin, Nov. 14.—Emperor William has acceded to the oft repeated request of Count von Hatzfeldt-Wildenburg, the German ambassador to Great Britain, to be allowed to retire from the diplomatic service on the ground of ill health.

IRON WORKERS' STRIKE ENDS

SETTLED AT SAN FRANCISCO.
Machinists Returning to Work—Most of the Large Establishments Will Run With Union Crews—Terms of Settlement Kept Quiet—Ridson and Union Works Still Nonunion.

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—The strike of iron workers which began in May 20 is bearing an end. About 500 men, mostly machinists, have returned to work at the Fulton Engineering and Shipbuilding works, and it is stated that all of the other big establishments will soon be run with full union crews.

The chief contention of the strikers was for nine hours work without any reduction of the ten hour pay schedule. Since the strike began many concerns have reduced their working day to nine hours, and it is asserted that over fifty shops are now running on a basis satisfactory to the unions.

The boiler makers and other iron workers involved in the local disturbance left their places in sympathy for the machinists. They were not organized by their national organizations, as were the machinists, and wherever a settlement has been made with the machinists, they have returned to work.

Neither the employers nor the leaders will state the terms on which the settlement of the strike is being effected. Some apparently well informed persons state that the men will receive an advance of from 3 to 7 per cent in wages, but others declare that the concession of a nine hour day means simply pay for nine hours' work.

The only large places in which the strike is still on are the Union and Ridson iron works and ship building works. There is a report that the former employes of the Ridson company will return to work in a few days, but this the labor union people refuse to affirm.

All negotiations are being quietly conducted, and definite information is difficult to obtain.
